

The Stanwood Chautauqua Association



From 1916 through 1923, a Community Chautauqua was held in Stanwood. It was located between Stanwood and East Stanwood on the south side of what is now 271st Ave NW. The Chautauqua was part of a national educational and social improvement movement that began in Chautauqua New York in the 1880s. It declined in the United States by the 1920s and the last Chautauqua in Stanwood was 1923. (See next page)

Its 2023 counterpart, Chautauqua Institution in New York, still exists and hosts many summer educational lectures and programs on a broad range



of arts and sciences topics*. It is now a "community of artists, educators, thinkers, faith leaders and friends dedicated to exploring the best in humanity." The purpose of Chautauqua gatherings was to help share "new worldly ideas" and were most common in towns where secondary education was limited. In 1918 Stanwood's first high school had only recently been built in 1914. Grades 9 –12 had been in the original 1892 building. What was most powerful about these organized lectures is that they gave those an extended opportunity to learn more about international and social issues of personal growth and public concern.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Season Tickets are on sale by the committee until noon of the opening day at \$2.50. War tax extra. After that time they advance to \$3.00. They are transferable only within the owner's immediate family.

Should You Forget to bring your season ticket, purchase a single admission from the cashier and get a receipt. Bring your season ticket to the next session and hand to the cashier with your receipt. She will then refund to you the amount of your single admission.

Onlider's Tickets at \$1.00 admit children in grammar grades. This ticket admits them to all regular Chautauqua programs as well as the Junior Chautauqua. Single Admissions to the various sessions amount to nearly three times the cost of a season ticket. Even though you attend but a few numbers, it is economy to buy a season ticket. Children's single admissions approximately half price.


Summer Wedding Party

The handwriting on the back of the photograph above indicates this is the wedding party of George and Thea (Westley) Engebretson. They were married July 1912 or 1913 depending on contradictory sources. The large farmhouse in the background was on the "Stubb Road". The Engebretson family home was on the Pioneer Highway. It was built in 1909 and is still standing. George and Thea observed their 50th wedding anniversary in 1963.

George was one of the youngest of nine children raised on the farm. His parents were John & Anna Engebretson from Norway who came to Norman in 1887 via Minnesota. Other children were Gertina (Gertie/Tina), Ellen, John,



Camano Lutheran Cemetery Columbarium Dedication, May 20, 2023

Above is a photograph of a crowd gathering on May 20, 2023 at the Camano Lutheran Cemetery to dedicate the Columbarium Center in honor of Allen Gilbertson, the sexton of the cemetery for 50 years. This ceremony was held to mark the completion of a major phase of improvements to the Camano Lutheran Cemetery on NE Camano Drive.

Now without the institutional memory of Allen Gilbertson, the Camano Lutheran Cemetery is being actively managed by Jeff Camp, President, Connie Hall, Secretary, Alan Hall, Treasurer & Archivist, Karen Camp, Sexton and a new groundskeeper James Leon. Flag Crew for Veterans remembrances are Jim Joyce and Bill Keller

There are several cemeteries in the community. A current list includes: the Florence Cemetery, Fir-Conway, Scandinavian Lutheran, Pleasant Hill, Cedarhome, Freeborn Lutheran, Old Our Saviour's, Our Saviour's Lutheran, Anderson, Camano Pioneer, Zion, and Valley View*{Passpost to The Past: A Guide to Exploring the Cemeteries in an Around Stanwood Washington, SAHS & Lincoln Hill High School, c.2002].

Below are excerpts of Connie and Alan's history of the Camano Lutheran Cemetery Project as an inspiration to us all:

The Camano Lutheran Cemetery is owned by Camano Lutheran Church and is managed by the Camano Lutheran Cemetery Volunteer Board. Over the years, the Board has established a cemetery endowment fund and because of careful fiscal management no fees for perpetual care are charged. You do not need to be a member of the Camano Lutheran Church nor do you need to be Lutheran to be interred at the cemetery. The cemetery interment is open to all persons, no exceptions.

Camano Lutheran Cemetery is a reflection of the community it serves as evidenced by early pioneers buried there. The historical/cultural significance of Camano Lutheran Cemetery is tied to the establishment and evolution of Camano Lutheran Church (State Register of Historical Site, 1979). The earliest record of the church services occurred in 1876, formalizing of a congregation in 1890. From then until 1920, logging thrived on Camano Island, with about 20 camps. Life was modest and remote with rough logging roads and supplies transported by horse-drawn wagons, scows, steamers, launches and/or cable ferries.

Camano Lutheran Church was formed by these early pioneers to celebrate the rites of marriage, birth, baptism and ultimately death. Lutheran churches had a long tradition of establishing their own cemeteries. Having a cemetery was also a matter of practicality.

Families often arranged to bury their dead together in a family plot of land which later grew into a true cemetery. This was the case of Camano Lutheran Cemetery. It was in 1921 that 2 1/2 acres was purchased and in 1961 one more acre of land was deeded to the church for the cemetery.

In this cemetery rests many early pioneers for example, Knute P. Frostad (1858-1942) who with his wife Bergitta (1856-1942) immigrated from Norway to Utsalady to obtain employment at the sawmill. He then purchased 41 acres near Livingston Bay to operate a successful dairy farm with a partner. He was elected to the State Legislature and served as Board Commissioner for Island County. Similarly, Margaret Kincaid (1875-1960) and her husband Robert (1867-1957) were known to welcome all. Almost every Camano Island pioneer family is represented at Camano Lutheran Cemetery. Today, the heritage of Camano Lutheran Cemetery is celebrated during Memorial Day honoring over 200 military veterans. Camano Lutheran Cemetery is included in the Camano Island Historic Sites Tour which provides an opportunity for cemetery board members to disseminate significant historic information of Camano Lutheran Cemetery to the public at large each year.

The Camano Lutheran Cemetery is a historic site


and was in need of serious restoration. So, in June of 2018, the Camano Lutheran Cemetery Board applied to the Washington State "Historic Cemetery Preservation Capital Grant Program" to acquire funds for three restoration projects. The grant application was approved as written and work began. The first request was to repave the road. Diseased trees near the frontage road were removed and a new bed designed and planted. The second request was to add power, lights and cameras for security. Metal plaques have been stolen from some graves by vandals and the Board decided to implement security measures to deter such action. The third request was to replace the old wood sign its now more durable and fitting monument.


The succession of phases since 2018 rehabilitating the cemetery could not be done without help of the community. There are many people we wish to thank for their generous contributions to the success of the project. Specifically we would like to thank the following people: Stanwood Area Historical Society, who offered the historical guidance critical to establishing this cemetery as a relevant restoration project, Carolyn Tobiason who financed the removal of the diseased spruce trees, Kathy Jeppsen owner of Wetland & Woodland, Inc. who donated 26 plants/trees for the bed around the new sign, Gene Hitt, (Gene's Well Drilling) who moved the three large rocks from the Handstad Farm to the new bed, John Naig, Paul Hoffman and Jason Otto who have and continue to offer advice on maintenance of grounds and lawn. Not all businesses will work on a grant-funded project so we would especially like to thank the following businesses who agreed to work with us. All worked with patience, perseverance and humor, despite a number of bumps along the way. Thank you to Island Masonry (Bruce

Aalmo, Camano Island), who helped design and build our sign, Pacific Coast Memorial (Everett) for the two granite inserts, Alpine Communications Systems (Stan LaBore, Camano Island) for security system, MADS Electric (Chuck Suffern, Camano Island) for power connections and lights, Stuart Wyatt, Ken Christoferson, Stanwood Redi-Mix, Jerry Whitbeck, Platt Electric, David Brandt, Mike Ryan, Gilbertson Funeral Home, Allen Gilbertson Family Donation, Granite Construction (Yakima) for resurfacing the road, the Snohomish County PUD for power/pole, and to Island County and Janet St. Clair for helping us to complete our project successfully.

We would also like to thank Julianne Patterson, director of the Washington State, Historic Cemetery Preservation Capital Grant Program, for her guidance, help and belief in this project. Implementing a grant is often challenging and Julianne smoothed the way and offered continuous support. Thank you to Julianne and all. —Connie & Alan Hall


