

After spending his youth in Wisconsin, Iowa and South Dakota at 22 he moved on to work on steamboats in Montana. His biography in Whitfield's says he was at the mouth of the Little Big Horn River in 1876 when Custer and his soldiers were killed. In 1891 he came to Stanwood to help his uncle Nels Leque in the harvest fields. His wife was Mary Olson from Wisconsin and they had ten children. Historic Buildings with Many Lives

Olmsted Home on 272nd St. in "East Stanwood"

In 1887, four years before the Great Northern Railroad laid its tracks through the Stillaguamish River Valley, a man named Ole Johnson bought two patent claims of 80 acres located east of Stanwood above the flood plain. In about 1900 Johnson sold 40 acres of that claim to Knute Husby who began selling 16 one-acre tracts out of forty acres. Husby himself retained 24 acres for his home place. He married Louisa Gunderson and they had six children and in future years one of the streets through the properties was named Husby Street.

Husby Street became Two hundred and seventy second (272nd St.). According to early Census Records the area was known as "Carnation Hill" for the 1914 Carnation Milk condensery that had been recently established in East Stanwood.

One of those who purchased part of this property was Asmund and Regine Hatvedt. They were originally from Norway who in 1882 had come to Washington territory where he was then employed at the Utsalady Mill. In the 1910 census they were farmers in Cedarhome and two of the sons worked for the Stanwood Creamery nearby and one for Knud Knudson, the jeweler. Their name is on an 1910 plat map that appears to indicate they had owned several lots or parcels. In the 1920 U. S. Census the Hatvedts they are still living in the property in a 1922 home two houses east of the Olmsted Home. Asmund died in 1923 and Regine went to live with her son, in Cedarhome.

Charles R. Amundson, East Stanwood Mayor from 1939 to 1943, built his home in a lot adjacent between Hatvedt and the future Olmstead Home in 1917.

Dr. Stephen Olmsted (1867-1932) and his wife Cordelia (1869-1943) bought their lot from Mrs. Hatvedt in 1922, the same year East Stanwood incorporated as a town separate from Stanwood.

Olmsted had been practicing in East Stanwood since about 1915. In March

of 1915 an article appeared in the East Stanwood Bulletin reporting that Mrs S. G. Olmstad (sic) was elected to the presidency of the Civic Improvement Club. "*The club*

plans to consider various civic and municipal questions town sanitation and public health nursing."

Their house was built in 1925 according to County records. Dr. Olmsted died in 1932 but his wife Cordelia Olmsted remained in the home until her death. The Olmsted's had two daughters, the oldest daughter was Lezlie who was a stereographer in a Doctor's Office until she died in 1930 two years before her father. The second daughter Dora/Dorothy (Elspeth) was a writer whose name appears on the deed as grantor. She moved to Seattle though if there is anyone who knew of her, please let us know!

In 1945 Gothe and Betty Oberg, originally from Sweden, purchased the home. Mr. Oberg donated to SAHS a 175 page daybook belonging to Dr. Olmsted. It contained his physicians financial notes covering 1911—1914. Gothe Oberg worked in the automobile business



and in a 1942 local phone book the Oberg Motor Company was located in East Stanwood.

In 1999, Gothe Oberg sold the home to Peter and Cara Federspiel who owned it for about 5 years. They added a back porch and enlarged the original kitchen and removed the original central stairs. The dining room contains its original light fixtures, radiators, and there are two built in cabinets with a laundry chute. They sold it in 2004 to Elizabeth Niemi, the current owner who has generously offered to share her home with many visitors during the 2023 Home Tour.

Niemi said the reason it faced East (she had been told) is that there had been a plan to build a street between the Amundson home and the Olmstead home. That did not happen but she had the original blueprints showing the early arrangement of the kitchen with a breakfast

room and side porch. The central stairs was removed and a back porch was added.

It is a beautiful Craftsman/Colonial with a front gable and large chimney. Owners over the years have retained most of the original interior features as well as the exterior. It has an



unusual underground garage (see photo on the left.)
The name of the designer was "R Hartmann

Builder—Designed Everett Wash."

World War I Home Coming Celebration, Stanwood, Wash. Sept 5, 1919. (SAHS 2005.15.14) This photographic postcard was owned by Peter Garberg of Freeborn (*Stanwood Story*, v. 2, p. 108) but it was donated by Alex Gedstad, whose family, the Joergensons, had a farm along the river possibly the one in the distance.

In 2018 the Stanwood Area Historical Society, under the guidance of Bill Keller and Jim Joyce, created the Stanwood Veterans' Memorial. They continue today to provide daily care of the Veterans' Memorial and the flags.


Granite pedestals within the Memorial list the names of 50 from the local area who gave their lives in American conflicts from World War I to the present. The memorial is completely self-funded and many of the stories of the local fallen were published in the Crab Cracker and have now been compiled in a book called "Solemn the Drums Thrill: Essays on the Fallen Heroes of Stanwood Camano: World War I to Afghanistan" by Richard Hanks, who donates all proceeds to the Memorial. The book is available at the Historical Society or on Amazon.

A separate Veterans' wall bears the names of veterans from throughout the United States whose bricks of remembrance pay homage to their service. We are in the process of proofing our sixteenth onsite brick engraving for the Veterans' Wall. This will bring us to a total of 266 engraved bricks. Our next deadline for brick orders will be September 30, 2023 and we already have three orders. Our goal is to get the next order engraved by Veterans' Day. The brick order form can be found on the SAHS website or the Stanwood Veterans Memorial Facebook page. The cost is \$150 a brick with the name of your veteran, living or deceased.

We will be having a **Veterans' Day Celebration on November 11, 2023 at 11:00 a.m. at the Floyd Norgaard Cultural Center** with music, flags, Veteran's insights, displays, Hero Quilts, videos, tours, coffee and cookies from the Cookie Mill.

The Veterans' Committee organizes programs on Memorial Day and Veterans' Day and now is part of the Wreaths Across America campaign which lays an evergreen laurel on the graves of local veterans. On December 16th at 10:00 a.m. we will be laying wreaths on Veterans graves at Anderson, Camano Lutheran and Camano Pioneer Cemeteries. Please join us for a remarkable experience. 

The Eye of the Beholder

Everyone who visits or volunteers at the museum sees a different story relating to our displays. One our new volunteers, Joel Spencer, discovered a unique pair of cork boots in our logging display donated many years ago by Mike Buse. These special boots with leather heels, cork soles with quarter in nails or spikes or cleets for tree climbers. Here is what Joel researched and wrote: At the turn of the 20th century, the Pacific Northwest was booming. Loggers, miners, and mill workers flooded Idaho, Washington, and Oregon. A man named Otto White's ambitions grew from a one-man shop to the White Shoe Company. He bought a small building and filled it with boots. As many as he could build, he sold. Even when the building burned to the ground from a formaldehyde candle he left overnight, Otto found a way to rebuild the company bigger and better. While his father, John, ran a one-man shop in St. Maries, Otto pushed the company toward its greatest growth opportunity: Spokane, WA


