

Above is a newly received photograph of the 1895 Stanwood Cooperative Creamery taken by Oliver S. Van Olinda. Van Olinda was the newspaper editor of the Stanwood Weekly Press with D. Carl Pearson between 1897 and 1900. This photograph is similar to other photographs of the creamery but taken earlier. It was among many others received from the family of Anton Anderson. The Creamery was insured for \$2,000 at the cost of \$45.00 in both 1895 and 1896 covering the building, the engine and boiler and all other machines "as is used in a creamery." The photograph on the upper right shows the location of creamery on the hillside to Startisboo Atten vieners Issue 81, March, 2024

Anton F. Anderson Cemetery Legacy

One of our recent catalog projects is a collection of family documents donated by the 5th generation of a family we knew very little about. It had been brought in by Mrs. Shanley Rubatino Van Ditto Lett in 2019 for safekeeping and study. She is the granddaughter of Anna Anderson Rubatino (1898—1990) who collected, compiled and profusely labeled her family's history in her own distinctive handwriting. Anna A. Rubatino (A.A.R) is the granddaughter of Norway's native son and pioneer Anton(e) Frederick Anderson (1834—1923).

The collection came to us meticulously preserved and notated her family's photos and documents with information on how she helped manage estates when parents and siblings passed, and achieved official Washington State Genealogical Society's Pioneer Family

certification in 1988. She was active in the American Legion and had passed the W.P.A "First Aide to the Injured" exam for wartime assistance with highest marks. Without her personal notations we would not have known that her Norwegian uncle died tragically driving a cart with runaway horses in 1895 in East Stanwood and other family lore.

There are 142 sets of chronologically sorted primary source documents for five generations of this Washington Territory Pioneer family (circa 1882 – 1988). This includes some documents and a map requiring delicate handling due to their age and condition.

The first generation, **Anton F. and Johannah "Jennie", arrived in the USA in 1868** from Christiania and Trondheim Norway with their two young sons, Christian and Andrew Anderson. They arrived in Stanwood WA in 1882 with some of their relations in the Torum, Tjerne, Sailstad, Olsen, and Lerstein Scandinavian families. This collection gives important views of the earliest



businesses (the Cooperative Creamery), schools, homes, plats, roadways and ways of life and death, as well as establishments of three historical Stanwood cemeteries, a hand drawn survey map circa 1891, and the succession of railroad companies.

In a sheriff's sale the 1902 Stanwood Fraternal Association building was put up for sale in 1904 and sold to Anton F. and Jennie Anderson for \$1684.15. In 1909 Anderson sold the building and the two lots for \$2,000 to the Stanwood Lodge #249 of the I. O. O F (International Order of Odd Fellows Hall (now the Floyd Norgaard Cultural Center)*

Anna's father was Andrew Anderson the only surviving son (1865 - 1955) who inherited, with his wife Anna Olina

(Torum) the farmlands and cemetery from Anton F. Their land straddled the "Great Northern Railway" tracks, today's Pioneer Hwy (St. Route 1; Highland Avenue in 1910), and is bordered by today's Marine Drive (west) and 532 (north). Many early arrivals

to Stanwood paid mortgages to Anton F. Anderson as he parceled out pieces of his land for homesites, or offered burial plots in the cemeteries he established.

The "Lutheran Cemetery" (now Our Saviours on Pioneer Hwy) was a part of Anton Anderson's parcel that he transferred to the first Norwegian Trinity Lutheran Church in 1898. In 1905 Anton and Jennie platted their own Anton F. Anderson Cemetery still visited today. In 1948 and 1950 conveyances were documented between Great Northern RR, Andrew Anderson and the Cedargreen Cemetery Association.

The viewing of this collection reveals that this family was incredibly loyal and responsible to each other and their extended family in Norway. There is an original receipt for a \$250.00 dollars money order, sent from Andrew Anderson to his Tjerne relation in 1915 in Norway. This would be \$7,600.00 in today's currency, in



the midst of WW I. The Anderson's were a stable resource for their neighbors, as well as diverse in their economic ventures, resilient, and hard working. Their bonds as a family and to the Scandinavian community of Stanwood, over five generations, were palpable in this collection.

Marion Duff–Interviewer & Writer

Marian Duff (1904-2001) and her husband Gerald (1901–1973) came to Stanwood about 1967. Marion graduated from Ballard High School in 1922 and she and her husband were married in September 1924. How they met is elusive perhaps because he was Canadian and naturalized in 1937.

In 1967 after raising two children living in Seattle, where he was a grocer and bookkeeper, they moved to Stanwood. She had been writing articles for the *Seattle Times*. The first article in the Times was in 1958. She wrote feature articles on topics like local schools, theater, art, firefighting, and one interesting one of the safety of sliding glass door panels. In 1964 one of her articles featured a history of Monte Cristo. She described her father's first job at the age of 16 in 1893 at the logging camp there. The sawmill failed and Loken moved to Ballard to work in another mill.

Mrs. Duff's first article in the *Stanwood News* appeared in 1968 featuring a history of Josephine Sunset Home. She wrote several more and then in February 1969 she wrote the first of her series called

Meet Stanwood's business people . . .

"*Meet Stanwood's Business People...*" It featured Lucille Hopkins, "one of this area's accomplished florists". Her extensive biographical and business series ended with an article about the short-lived business "Alternatives in Wood" which appeared eight year laterin September 1975.

There are over 200 articles for which she interviewed business owners about their careers and introduced new businesses, usually taking photographs. After she stopped writing other reporters contributed for a few more years to the series including Judy Starr, Carol Schmidt, Becky Walker and some unattributed. The cumulation of these articles form a

eporters contributed for a few more years to the ttributed. The cumulation of these articles form a unique biographical history of the area. Only a small number of the businesses are still around or they have moved or changed names. The articles represent the amazing variety of the entrepreneurial success stories and not so successful stories of a small town.

While doing her interviews, photographs and writing her articles Marion Duff was also one of the charter members of the Stanwood Area Historical Society bringing together many in the community to help accomplish this cause. In her papers were letters to the Wasbington State Historic Preservation officer about the D. O. Pearson Historical Register nomination. She donated many of her papers to the museum in the 1980s

<u>The Hamilton Stack</u>

One of Marion Duff's articles featured Dennis Hamilton of J. E. Hamilton & Sons in November of 1969. His story tells of when the

Hamilton family moved to Stanwood after ventures in Anacortes and later Burlington and Coupeville. After selling lumber from the area around Madrona Beach, they took over the mill that had been closed where the landmark stack remains.

The mill had closed in 1929 as the Depression came on. The buildings burned first in 1936. J. E. Hamilton & Sons had a small mill and also established their current lumber vard on "Burnway" (271st). The mill property extended from their current lumber vard to the river where the stack had been constructed in 1927 by then owners, the Clough Mill (formerly Wisconsin Timber Company) to raise the smoke above the town. Hamilton established their lumber sales yard and a finishing mill. It was an all-electric mill that took 13 months to build. In May 1954 the Hamilton had about 20–40 workers and was very successful until another fire in 1957. Different companies tried to operate again in 1958, 1959, 1960 and 1965. After the numerous fires and setbacks the attempt to run a mill there was finally abandoned. Hamilton took it over again and finally sold sections along the river and S. R. 532 cut through the site in the 1960s.




